

Letter from the Vicarage December 2021

Hi Everyone,

How are we all doing? I hope and pray that you are all managing to keep fit and well, and that

you are beginning to look forward to Christmas. Are you ready, I wonder.

Have you dug out the tree, and the lights from wherever you keep them? Have you heeded all the warnings about shortages and supply difficulties and got ahead of the game, in terms of buying your presents, or ordering your Christmas groceries?

At the time of writing, at least, one thing I expect you won't have been able to do, is to plan what you are going to watch on the television over the festive period; but it won't be long now before the bumper issues of the TV listings magazines appear in the shops. I remember that my Dad, when he was alive, would pore over the *Radio Times* with a highlighter pen in hand, so as to mark up anything that caught his eye that he might want to watch. I wonder, do you do anything like that?

Of course this being the December/January edition of the Parish magazine, it is our bumper issue, and as such covers the whole of the greater Christmas season, from the beginning of Advent, through the 12 days of Christmas and then the days of Epiphany until we mark and celebrate the feast of Candlemas which in 2022 we will do in our services on the 30th January.

I wonder what highlights might you be looking at, and marking up, for your Christmas worship, this year? What services did you particularly miss when our festivities were curtailed so much last year?

Hopefully, the course of the pandemic, will allow us to go ahead with our usual offerings: hopefully, we can count down the Sundays to Christmas as we light our Advent candles, reminding ourselves how God was a real presence in the lives of the ancient Fathers and Mothers of the faith; in the lives of the Old Testament prophets; in the life, faith and witness of John the Baptist; in the life of the young girl whose life God turned upside down when he asked her to be the God-bearer; and in the life of the Christ child who is present with us always, but whose presence we know more clearly in the Christmas story.

Hopefully, we will be able to tell the story in word and song in our Carol services and our Blessing of the Crib services; in our Christmas Day services; and in our special Christingle services, that hopefully will take place in January, during the Epiphany season.

I realise that is a lot of 'hopefully's!

But Advent, and Christmas are seasons to reflect upon Hope. We remember that 2000 years ago amid the hardships of Roman occupation, God came in the form of the Christ child, as the Messiah, the anointed one, and changed the course of our history. So we can rejoice in the love that God has for us his creation, and place our hopes in His loving for us.

Have a blessed and hope filled Christmas.

Merrell and Bibby started work on the 15th November and the portacabin went off site very quickly in preparation for excavation of the foundations. It is hoped to get these in by Christmas to prepare a solid base for the main building.

Grants have already been received or promised from six charities, and more recently the builders of Whittington Walk, Persimmon. Further applications have been made to complete the funding for the scheme.

Further updates on progress will be given during the course of construction. During construction facilities available to the church will be limited, though services will continue as usual. Portable toilets have been provided. Every effort is being made to minimise the effect of the works on the life of the church and the use of the churchyard.

The Chairman in welcoming Richard spoke of the value and importance in having a representative from the Wildmore area of the parish. There remains a vacancy on the Parish Council and it is hoped that a resident of the new Whittington Walk development will come forward so that area of the Parish also has a representative.


The Parish Council, in being asked by Wychavon to comment on planning applications expressed a view that when deciding on applications consideration should be given to the importance of preserving the rural identity of the Parish of Whittington. This principle is particularly relevant in respect of the proposed South Worcestershire Development Plan for housing development across the parishes of Whittington, Stoulton, Norton and Drakes Broughton.

A defibrillator has been donated very kindly to the Parish by Nick and Anita Hodgetts. It is being installed before Christmas on the Community Hall so it is readily available to all.

Whittington Community Hall

The new Hall has now been in use for three months and is already well used with many bookings. Most finishing works are complete, including the landscaping and cycle shelter. The problems with acoustics in the hall are well recognised and are being addressed with solutions expected to be in place early next year. The new Hall has been regarded by **Wychavon District Council** as a 'Flagship Project', and the Council has provided a major grant from Section 106 monies to enable the scheme to go ahead.

Schools are nearing the end of the autumn term 2021, with many of the usual educational structures being reinstated during this term: Ofsted inspections resumed in September; School Development Plans were drawn up and begun; children gathered together for assemblies. Children, families and staff hoped that the disruption of the previous 18 months was drawing to an end.

Generally this has been the case. Our school has stayed open. However, there have been bumps in the road with Covid19 outbreaks in certain classes seeing over half of the pupils absent from school. We have persevered with ensuring that our teaching and learning offer is as good as it can possibly be, whilst also planning in safeguards to reduce the risk from the virus to our school community. The two principles working hand in hand.

Two questions spring to mind: has the autumn term been a success; and is school life back to normal? In answer to the first, it has been a very successful term. Children are fully engaged with their learning; we are developing teaching and learning; participation in events outside the school have restarted, so the children are receiving an interesting and engaging curriculum. In regard to whether things are 'back to normal', none of us are entirely sure what normal is any more. However, the children are used to the changes we have had to make in order to keep them safe, so life in school does feel (new) normal.





From the Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Iones.

Let's hope we can celebrate Christmas more openly and at ease this year than last! Looking back over the past 18 months or so it is hard to believe how much



we've had to put up with and how we've changed our behaviour in order to stay safe. I'm amazed how we have adapted our lives. Who would have thought that wearing masks in crowded places would become second nature? That a nationwide vaccination programme would have been so successfully developed? And that we'd all get used to administering lateral flow tests ourselves?

We have learned to manage public worship as safely as possible. We have celebrated funerals, weddings and family events in new and creative ways, though at some cost along the way. We have had to concentrate on the essentials. We have put ourselves out to look after ourselves and others with practical loving-kindness. Although we lost so much, it seems to me we have gained much as well. Perhaps, you could say, we put the heart back into human society.

Do you remember how last year's Christmas celebrations were much more muted than usual? People commented on how much they actually enjoyed the simplicity of pared down celebrations and an albeit enforced break with old routines. We had to re-think. We had to ask what really counted. We had to improvise - because we couldn't sing in church, we went outside to sing our carols. Strangely enough we took Christmas back to where it first began - not shut inside holy places, however beautiful, but outside in the world God so loved.

Mary and Joseph also had to improvise as they found a place for their son to be born. The heart of Christmas was born in the mucky manger of Bethlehem: even there, surely, their hearts sang for joy. The beating heart of Christmas was and is the Babe of Bethlehem, born for us.

Love came down at Christmas, love all lovely, Love Divine; Love was born at Christmas, stars and angels gave the sign. (Christina Rossetti) I wonder what will make our hearts sing this Christmas. MP for Mid-Worcestershire, Nigel Huddleston, visited Fladbury CE First School last week to hear a message for the world about climate change.

The school were flying two naval flags underneath the Union flag outside the



school. The top flag represents the letter 'W' as well as meaning 'urgent medical attention needed, and the second flag represents the letter 'E' as well as 'changing course to avoid a collision'. Shown together, the flags spell out the message that 'WE recognise our planet needs urgent attention and WE must change course.'

The event was organised by David Train, former Olympic Canoe coach who uses special 'bell boats' and paddles, alongside the flags, to take his message on climate change to people around the world. He said:

"The bell boats are all about people working together, and every time a 'paddle for life' is created, we plant a new tree. Together with the flags flying under our national flag, we've created a powerful message about both our heritage and our shared future. We have worked with Fladbury First School for over thirty years and it's appropriate that our MP is able to visit to see what we're doing."

Nigel was given miniature versions of the flags to keep on his desk at Westminster. He said: "David is incredibly passionate about the environment and climate change. We all know that everyone needs to work together to ensure that the Earth is in a good state when the children currently at Fladbury school have grown up and for their children. We all have our part to play to protect the planet."

Headteacher, Julie Wilson, said: "the children of Fladbury School are equally passionate about climate change and have a real drive and determination to make change happen. We raise and strike our flags on Fridays as we say this poem, written by David himself:



WE raise and strike on Fridays, two flags which say it all How our blue planet's in danger and WE must change our course. WE need our leaders with us, on board and paddling hard, If we're to change the climate and save all life from harm.

We raise and strike on Fridays so rulers of our land WILL listen to the children and clap them with their hands So now on every Friday until our planets safe WE raise and strike, WE raise and strike Two flags which say it all

The Children's Society Good Childhood report for 2021 shows that modern life continues to erode the happiness of young people, with increased numbers dissatisfied with school, their friendships and their appearance.

It has been reported that many are now plagued by new worries about their future, especially in terms of having enough money, finding a job and getting good grades, as well as the climate emergency. Despite this, seven in ten 10-17 year olds are optimistic about the future regardless of the uncertainties reinforced by the pandemic.

The Children's Society runs services and campaigns to improve children's lives, reignite their hope and change the systems that are placing them in danger.

Church launches consultation on plans to get to net zero carbon in just nine years

The Church of England is consulting dioceses, cathedrals, national institutions, parishes, schools, and other interested parties on a proposed route map to achieve net zero carbon by 2030. The draft route map suggests how all parts of the Church of England can make changes together, in order to achieve the ambitious target set by General Synod in 2020: to be net zero carbon 20 years ahead of the Government's targets.

It includes recommendations for building maintenance, heating and the availability of specialist advice for each, setting alongside how the central Church and dioceses can offer support. The draft net zero carbon route map was written by a sub-committee of the Church of England's Environmental Working Group, chaired by the Bishop of Selby, Dr John Thomson.

He said: "God's creation is in crisis, and there is an urgent call to address this at every level of our global community. "Synod has set an ambitious target. We recognise this will be challenging, however many adaptations can also be made simply and quickly, such as switching to a green energy provider, filling gaps in windows, and changing lightbulbs, all of which can help to reduce energy costs. "I encourage individuals and communities to engage with these consultation proposals and to think at every level what can be done to be part of the change. We need to safeguard and care for all of God's creation."

The Government has committed to a target of net zero carbon by 2050, with an interim target of a 78 per cent reduction, set in April 2021. Anyone can respond to the consultation online before the closing date of 28 February 2022, with responses particularly requested from Dioceses and Cathedrals.

St Mark in the Cherry Orchard Diocese of Worcester



News & Views from St Mark in the Cherry Orchard

A Tribute to the Late, and much missed, Audrey Luxton.

Audrey led a full and, for those who knew her in her later years, a surprisingly action-packed life and it was a testament to her popularity that St Mark in the Cherry Orchard Church was packed with nearly 100 people, young and old, to bid her farewell.

Audrey taught at a number of primary schools in Worcester including the original Cherry Orchard in Orchard Street, Gorse Hill and Cranham Drive, usually teaching the reception classes. Her wonderfully neat 'print' handwriting, crafted at teacher training college in Cheltenham, reflected an era before computers. She



helped to run Cherry Orchard playgroup and was subsequently involved in leading courses to train others to run playgroups, later going on to work with pre-school children and their families at the Hillborough Family Centre in Stanley Road School where she stayed until her retirement. She often bumped into former pupils, or families she had worked with in and around Worcester, who, even decades later, remembered her kindness.

Guiding played an important role in her life from her own time as a Girl Guide, to assisting with the local Brownie Pack and helping to run St Mark's Guides. The annual summer Guide Camp was the big adventure of her childhood and, as a leader, she rose to the challenge, sleeping under canvas and cooking for the whole week on a wood fire. More recently she was an active member of the local Trefoil Guild, supporting behind the scenes at many guiding events.

Audrey was an intelligent, devoted and selfless mother who always put family needs first and enjoyed an active and community-focussed retirement. As well as the Guide Association, she volunteered for many years with several local organisations including the Tudor House Museum, Talking Newspapers for the Blind, Worcestershire Wildlife Trust and the Worcester Green Party. She was an active member of the local WI and Ladies Club and, of course, the congregation at St Mark's Church.

Although a voracious reader, Audrey never got used to the idea of sitting down and reading in the day, whilst not being able to volunteer or help others. She was frustrated by the limitations that arose from the lockdowns and vowed that once her health improved, she would help out at the local toddler group when it restarted in a church very near to her home, just as she'd done at St Marks, but sadly, it was not to be and Audrey passed away on 12 October.

Bless you, Audrey, we all think of you often.

St Marks is delighted to once more be able to offer refreshments to those attending the services in the Church. It is an opportunity to catch up with people who may not have seen each other for some time. Everyone will be made most welcome and, if you prefer, you can receive your tea or coffee in a polystyrene cup. Flyers are now available in Church, for the congregation to take away, advertising the Christmas and Christingle Services, a copy of which is printed in this edition.

Cherry Orchard Ladies Club

Having had to cancel his talk twice, **Jonathan Sutton, CEO of St Paul's Hostel on Tallow Hill**, was finally able to speak to the members at the November meeting. He began by sharing that he had been in the armed forces for 30 years. His last appointment was the Military Assistant Regional Joint Liaison Officer for the West Midlands with responsibilities for Military Aid to the Civil Community such as resilience during 'flu pandemics and other emergencies, something that was to be particularly useful during the Covid situation.

Jonathan is also the Voluntary Services representative on the County Health and Well Being Board and a co-opted member of Healthwatch Worcestershire

St Pauls opened in 1977, but the work began before the charity was founded in partnership with The Salvation Army. At that time, the residents mostly consisted of male occupants affected by alcohol not drugs.

Jonathan joined the staff 8 years' ago and found it disorientating, chaotic and sometimes dangerous and he quickly realised that there was a need to change the culture. He said that one should think of homelessness as an iceberg where you can only see the tip — rough sleeping - whilst under water there is a cohort of hidden homeless and, on a typical night in England, there could be as many as 250,000 of them; sleeping in over crowded buildings, cars, or hostels (the government does not count the hidden homeless but does annually count people rough sleeping).

People who experience homelessness can be perceived as being to blame for the situations that they find themselves in. Jonathan said that this was an unfair myth and gave details of three structural determinants of homelessness, namely:

Poverty is the biggest risk and the largest single contributor. There is not enough social housing; cost and affordability are very different subjects and St Pauls can only help for between 18 and 24 months. The welfare system has little resources which leads to difficult choices; eat or heat.

Begging is on the increase in Worcester so if you want to help someone, give wisely. Never give cash because it is likely to be spent on drugs or alcohol but you could offer food or a hot drink. Lobby your MP; prevention is better than cure. Visit their web site www.stpaulshostel.co.uk for more information.

Thank Dickens for Christmas as you know it!

Ever wonder where many of our Christmas traditions come from? A surprising amount of our modern Christmas celebrations can be traced back to the well-loved story of 'A Christmas Carol', by Charles Dickens.

When you read 'A Christmas Carol', you discover almost a template of the 'ideal Christmas' which we still hold dear today. Dickens seems to have selected the best of the Christmas celebrations of his day (he ignored some of the odd excesses) and packaged them in such a way as to give us traditions that we could accommodate and treasure – more than a century later.

So, for instance, in A Christmas Carol, Christmas is a family day, with a family-centred feast. In a home decorated with holly and candles the characters enjoy a roast turkey, followed by Christmas pudding. They give their loved ones presents. Scrooge even gives donations to charity (!).

And all the while outside, there is snow and frost, while church bells ring, and carol singers sing, and hope for mulled wine. In 'A Christmas Carol' there is even a Father Christmas – in the shape of Christmas Present. Only the Christmas tree itself came later, when Prince Albert imported 'a pretty German toy' that won the heart of the English court, and hence the rest of Victorian society.

26 December Look out for Wenceslas

Most of us probably know that on December 26th (the Feast of Stephen) 'Good king Wenceslas' looked out, *writes David Winter*. We probably also know that the snow lay round about, 'deep and crisp and even'. Beyond that, he's just someone in a carol that's not often sung nowadays.

However, Wenceslas was a real person, a duke, and effectively king of Bohemia in the 10th century. In modern terms, he was Czechoslovakian. He was known as a generous and kind monarch, deeply Christian and given to good works. So the story in the carol by the Victorian hymn-writer J.M. Neale, while possibly fictitious, is at least in line with his recognised character. 'Page and monarch' braved the 'bitter weather' and the 'cruel wind's wild lament' to take food and fuel to a poor man living rough.

Neale's carol was enormously popular in the 19th century, because it perfectly expressed Victorian Christian ideals of benevolence and alms-giving. Christian men of 'wealth and rank' are urged to help the poor, and so 'find blessing'. Ignoring the 'wealth and rank and men' bit, it's still good advice, at Christmas or any other time.
